Invitation

L: You are invited to the table of our Lord Jesus Christ. Here we have a feast for the people of God, a sign of Jesus' body and blood given in love to save us. Men, Women, and Children, all who have committed their lives to Jesus are welcome to take the bread and juice to sustain them on their journey of faith.

When you come forward, please take the bread and hold it, and then dip it into the juice as a symbol of the body and blood of Christ.

Words of Institution

On the night he was handed over, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread, and after giving thanks to God, broke it and gave it to his disciples. He said, "Take, eat; this is my body which is given for you. Do this in remembrance of me."

After supper Jesus took the cup; and after giving thanks, gave it to them and said, "Drink this, all of you; this is my blood of the new covenant which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, remember me. Do THIS IN REMEMBRANCE OF ME.

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Let's pray together:

God of grace, we give you thanks for this bread, and your son Jesus Christ who came to save us. The love of Jesus shines through the years, his death on the cross, his broken body has become the bread of life which sustains us. As we eat this bread and drink this juice, remind us that we are part of his body, living for him, giving for him. Amen.

L: God of grace, thank you for raising Jesus Christ from the dead, our hope for life eternal. Holy Spirit, fill us with your strength to be the body of Christ on earth, God's church in Laos and Los Angeles, in Hawaii and Havana, in Ethiopia and Edmonton, and here in this congregation, in Portsmouth, New Hampshire.

Brothers and sisters, we remember the body of Christ, broken for us and the blood of Christ shed for us. Thank you, Jesus for loving us to the end of your life. We share the bread and cup remembering your sacrifice for our sins, your love which never ended, your love which sustains us still. **ALL: Amen.**

It is in this bread and this cup that we remember Christ's love for us and receive forgiveness of sins and the commissioning to be the body of Christ together in this world. ALL are welcome to come to this table.

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"Our Children" – 6/2/19 First UMC – Rev. Dr. Debra J. Hanson

SCRIPTURE: Mark 10:13-16

THEME: Jesus loves the vulnerable and powerless.

It may seem odd to us in our day and age to read this passage from Mark and hear that the disciples wanted to prevent children from going to Jesus. We know that children can be very active, noisy, and sometimes even pester us. We know they are sources of worry, anxiety, and challenges because we want to do what is best as parents, grandparents, aunts, uncles, teachers, and leaders. And we also know that children are a source of our pride, incredible love, and more precious than we could ever imagine. So, why would the disciples try to keep the children away from Jesus, especially since even earlier in the gospel of Mark he had taught that we must be like children in order to enter the kingdom of God?

Sometimes, knowing the culture of Jesus' day is helps us to understand better what is happening when we read scripture. In our 21st century, we value and lift up children, giving them opportunities to grow and learn and become people who make a difference in the world. Society during biblical times was very different from our experience. Children and women were seen as unimportant – as possessions, and the children were mostly considered to be nuisances. They were just supposed to be hidden away and out of sight until they grew up into adulthood. The women in the families raised the children to act properly and behave, and when the boys reached the age of twelve, they were considered ready for manhood – today we see the ceremony called Bar Mitzvah that recognizes this.

For Jesus to welcome children and rebuke the disciples for keeping them away, says a lot about Jesus and who was valuable in God's eyes. Jesus paid attention to children and women and the vulnerable of his society, giving them honor and respect. He loved the children. Years ago I watched a video called "The Gospel Road" produced by Johnny Cash and his wife June Carter Cash. While I don't remember a lot about the video except that it followed Jesus life from birth to resurrection, there was a scene in it that always stands out in my mind.

In this scene, Jesus is on the beach playing with children, running in and out of the water, picking them up to hug them, and joyfully splashing around with them. It struck me and has stayed with me, as you can see. It was almost as powerful a statement to me as the cover for today's bulletin with some artist's depiction of Jesus and a child. This just warms my heart and reminds me of the great love Jesus has for everyone. We don't often see pictures of Jesus smiling or laughing, but there is so much love shown in this picture!



The love of God has been incarnated through Jesus whose message was that everyone, including the powerless and cast-asides, are part of God's family. EVERYONE is welcome. We are all loved for who we are as God's precious children. We are all welcome in God's house. It is sometimes hard to comprehend the depth of Jesus' love for us, but his death on the cross opened the doors for forgiveness, renewal, and life eternal. Our families are often the first place where we begin to learn about and experience love, which can reflect God's love for us.

One of my favorite stories about the love we humans show each other and reflect God's love to one another is about *John Todd, who was born in Rutledge, Vermont, into a family of several children. They later moved to the village of Killingsworth back in the early 1800s. And there, at a very young age, both John's parents died.*

The relatives wondered what they would do with so many children, how they could parcel them out to other friends and relatives. One dear and loving aunt said she would take little John. The aunt sent a horse and a servant to get John, who was only six at the time.

The servant, Caesar, came and put the little boy on the back of the horse. On the way back an endearing conversation took place: John: Will she be there? Caesar: Oh, yes, she'll be there waiting up for you. John: Will I like living with her? Caesar: My son, you fall into good hands. John: Will she love me? Caesar: Ah, she has a big heart. John: Will I have my own room? Will she let me have a puppy? Caesar: She's got everything all set, son. I think she has some surprises, too. John: Do you think she'll go to bed before we get there? Caesar: Oh, no! She'll be sure to wait up for you. You'll see when we get out of these woods. You'll see her candle shining in the window.

When they got to the clearing, sure enough, there was a candle in the window and she was standing in the doorway. She reached down, kissed him, and said "Welcome home!" She fed him supper, took him to his room, and waited until he fell asleep. John Todd grew up to be a great minister of the gospel. But it was there at his aunt's, his new mother, that he grew up. It was always a place of enchantment because of his aunt. It awed him that she had given him a second home. She had become a second mother to him.

Years later, long after he had moved away, his aunt wrote to tell him of her impending death. Her health was failing and she wondered what was to become of her. This is what John Todd wrote her:

"My Dear Aunt, Years ago I left a house of death not knowing where I was to go, whether anyone cared, whether it was the end of me. The ride was long but Caesar encouraged me. Finally, he pointed out your candle to me, and there we were in the yard and you embraced me and took me by the hand into my own room that you had made up. After all these years I still can't believe it--how you did all that for me! I was expected; I felt safe in that room--so welcomed. It was my room. Now it's your turn to go, and as one who has tried it out, I'm writing to let you know that Someone is waiting up. Your room is all ready, the light is on, the door is open, and as you ride into the yard--don't worry, Auntie. You're expected! I know. I once saw God standing in your doorway--long go!" (Illustrations Unlimited, pp. 377-378, #7)

As a church family, we light that candle of hope to all God's children, and we offer that kind of hope to our children. Aren't we blessed to have them! Some of you may have realized by now that children are a huge priority in my ministry. When I went to Goodwins Mills years ago, I was asked if we should have a Sunday school. I asked how many children were there, and they said "two." My answer was, "Then we should have a Sunday school." We had teachers lined up, and the word got around eventually. By the time I left, we had about 15 children and two classrooms. Before I started here at First UMC, I received a slightly panicked email saying that we suddenly had a family with six children come to church, "Should we have Sunday school? What curriculum should we use?" I said "yes" and suggested a curriculum from our Cokesbury publishing house, so Sunday school started for them the next week.

In December, we had a wonderful pageant that the children presented and everyone enjoyed, and this next Sunday is not only Pentecost, but it is Children's Sunday when we celebrate their presence with us as part of the church. While Children are most certainly our future, they are also our present, a vital and important part of our identity right now. I think we all learn something from them during the children's time and when we engage them in conversation. They have much to offer and can offer words of wisdom, as well as the faith that we all can remember when we are talking about living with Christ in our lives. "We must have faith like a little child," Jesus said. In other words, asking questions, learning, being open to God's actions, and trusting that God is at work in our lives.

Maybe my favorite verse in this short passage from Mark is when Jesus takes the children up in his arms and blesses them. There is love, trust, and grace in this passage, and it always makes me feel the love of Jesus. We all can use that sense of being loved, no matter how old or young we are, no matter what our life's situation might be.

My great nephew Connor was born with Cerebral Palsy and learning disabilities. He has limited speech capabilities, but that doesn't mean he can't communicate! He has been learning sign language and receiving physical and speech therapy. At seven years old, he has made great progress toward walking, driving his motorized wheelchair, and winning the hearts of everyone he meets. Our family loves him because he is so precious, and we have learned a lot about God's love for us as well as acceptance of each other because of Connor's challenges. We understand even more how much God loves ALL of God's children.

So, I hope you will be here next Sunday to celebrate our kids who will be a big part of helping in the worship service. I hope you will be here next Sunday to celebrate the birthday of the church at Pentecost (and you can wear something with the color red if you wish). As we celebrate the Church of Jesus Christ, may we remember again and again that WE are the church. WE are God's children who are called to care for one another, build each other up, provide learning and leadership opportunities for our children, and send each other into the world to make a difference in the ways we act and speak. Maybe it's helpful to ask, "How am I reflecting Christ to the world?" "Are my actions treating the other person as if they are a child of God?" "Do my words help or hurt?" "In what ways can I make a difference?"

The word "love" in the Bible is about respect, kindness, wholeness, and wishing good for the other person's well-being. Let us love God with all that we are and share that love with others. Let us pray: Gracious and loving God, you make us for each other, to live in loving community as friends, sons and daughters, sisters and brothers, wives and husband, partners and companions. Teach us to choose love that is committed and devoted; teach us like little children to wonder and to trust, that our loving may reflect the image of Christ. Amen.
