

Dear Friends,

This month I am sharing a devotional written by Rev. Talitha Arnold from June 14, 2021 and posted on Still Speaking Daily Devotions. She writes:

My heart is steadfast, O God, my heart is steadfast. - Psalm 108:1a (NRSV)

Saguaro cactus are steadfast. On less than 10 inches of rain a year, with temperatures that range from 120 degrees down to freezing, the iconic "giants of the desert" live on average for 150 to 200 years.

Saguaros grow in only one part of the world: the Sonoran Desert that stretches from southern Arizona to northern Sonora (Mexico) and west to a small corner of California. They've been a part of that landscape of rock and hard sand for 10,000 years. They are steadfast.

It's doubtful the author of Psalm 108 ever saw a saguaro. Yet I think they would have appreciated these long-lasting denizens of the desert, especially the lessons they offer in staying steadfast when life is rocky and hard. Unlike tumbleweeds that spring up quickly after a rain but blow away when life gets hard, saguaros grow slowly, putting out roots that are as broad underground as the plant is tall above ground. They have the foundation they need to remain steadfast through thunderstorms and blistering sun.

The saguaro's adaptability is also key to its tenacity. Most trees have a central trunk, but a saguaro has ribs. When the rains come, the cactus expands to store water for the dry times. When a bird pecks into its skin, the cactus forms a "shoe" around the injury for protection—just as the psalmist looks too God to be a "fortified city" in their time of trouble.

The psalmist strengthens their faith in God through thanks and praise, proclaiming "I will awake the dawn." Every morning, the upraised arms of God's steadfast saguaros do the same. Prayer: Thank you, Creator God, for your steadfast saguaros and all the other lessons of your Creation. Amen.

We, too, can praise God and trust that we are resilient and hope-filled as we move toward the light at the end of this pandemic tunnel. May this reflection be a blessing to you!

On Tuesday, June 22, a special church conference was held to approve funding for the Visioning Task Force projects. The total approved from the Parkhurst bequest was as follows\*:

-\$110,703 for completing the masonry work -\$126,550 for improvements, upgrades, and building repairs, painting the sanctuary and hallways, new carpeting and floor tile, pew cushions, and fixing the three pulpit chairs.

-\$85,945 to build an Outreach and Communication Ministry, including hiring a director, new digital and sound equipment, new FUMC website and increased outreach digitally to the community.
-\$80,000 pay off the parsonage mortgage.

The remainder of the bequest has been invested at the United Methodist Foundation of New England.

We are blessed and grateful for the insight and generosity of Gertrude Parkhurst and for her love of this church that led her to set up a bequest in order to help the church continue and grow in ministry!

In tandem, the General Fund supports salaries, utilities, and programming, and has managed to keep the bills and staff paid. We do ask that you prayerfully consider your continue stewardship and your creative way of investing your FUMC \$50.

## WE REMEMBER AND ARE GRATEFUL



Gertrude Hatfield Parkhurst, 93, of Portsmouth, passed away peacefully on Friday, February 22, 2019 at Wentworth Senior Living in Portsmouth. She was born on September 15, 1925 in Portsmouth, New Hampshire, to John Rodney and Marion Vera (Hatfield) Parkhurst.

Trudy was a graduate of Portsmouth High School, Class of 1943; University of New Hampshire, Class of 1946; Yale University School of Nursing, Class of 1949; and Boston University School of Nursing, Class of 1960, receiving her master's degree in Nursing Administration.

She proudly served her country for over 10 years in the United States Army Nurse Corps, serving during the Korean War. She served for a time at an Army Hospital in Germany, at Togus Veterans Hospital in Maine, at Letterman Hospital in San Francisco, and at hospitals in Battle Creek MI, and in Texas. At the time of her retirement, Trudy had lived in Rhode Island for many years and was employed at Rhode Island Hospital in Providence. She had also worked at other hospitals including Mass General Hospital in Boston, Brockton Hospital in MA, and The Miriam Hospital in Providence, serving as a nurse and/or nursing administrator.

Trudy was a lifelong member of the First United Methodist Church in Portsmouth, NH. She was an avid reader, loved animals, and enjoyed traveling. She visited many places in Europe, traveled to China, and enjoyed a wonderful trip through the Panama Canal with her sister, Jane. Another memorable journey was to Antarctica, which she enjoyed with her niece, Nancy. She was predeceased by her longtime friend and companion, Doris Berry, and a number of other close nursing friends.

Survivors include her sister, Jane Richards of Rye; nieces, Nancy Richards (Susan) of Brevard, NC, and Carol Bovee (David) of Dover; nephews, John Richards (Carol) of Peterborough and David Richards (Susan) of Dover; and also many great nieces and nephews.

#### **OUTSIDE:**


- Repair and repointing of the stone facade




#### **RECOGNITION OF VOLUNTEERS**


#### **FACE TIME**




