GREAT PRAYER OF THANKSGIVING

L: The Lord be with you.

P: And also with you.

L: Lift up your hearts.

"Excuses, Excuses, Excuses" – 8/4/19 First UMC – Rev. Dr. Debra J. Hanson

SCRIPTURE: John 5:1-9

THEME: God's grace is for all people.

One Sunday morning, a husband and his wife rose early, and the wife began to dress for church. It was just about time for them to leave for the service when she noticed that her husband hadn't moved a finger toward getting dressed. Perplexed, she asked, "Why aren't you getting dressed for church?" He said, "Because I don't want to go." She asked, "Do you have any reasons?" He said, "Yes, I have three good reasons. First, the congregation is cold. Second, no one likes me. And third, I just don't want to go." His wife answered, wisely, "Well, honey, I have three reasons why you should go. First, the congregation is warm. Second, there are a few people who like you. And third, you're the pastor! So get dressed!" (*Illustrations Unlimited, p. 182, #2*)

I'm sure there are times when all pastors have felt like making excuses for not attending some church event or service. Excuses are convenient ways of not facing issues that face us, whether it's in church, at work, with our families or friends, or other challenging situations. Excuses take the place of responsibility or somehow make us feel less guilty about something. They can reflect apathy or just being comfortable where we are instead of trying to move forward, like the man at the pool of Bethzatha (also sometimes called Bethesda, which is much easier to say!).

When we look more closely at the story there are some things we can note: Jesus was just walking near this pool when he noticed this man who was on his pallet waiting for the waters to move. He had been there 38 years! Why Jesus noticed him is a mystery, but for some reason he picked this man out of many who were waiting by the pool to try to be healed from its mysterious power.

Yet, when Jesus asked the man if he wanted to be healed, the man never answered his question. Instead he whined about waiting and waiting, and said when the water <u>did</u> stir, no one would help him into it. Someone always "beat him to it." Instead of engaging this man in a conversation or asking him about his faith, Jesus just told him to pick up his pallet and walk. The man did. Note that the man didn't tell Jesus that he wanted to be healed, nor did he thank him or go to the temple to praise God for being healed.

If we were to read past verse 9, we would discover that the man was confronted by the temple leaders who reprimanded him for carrying his pallet on the Sabbath – something that is considered work – a "no-no" on the Sabbath. His answer was to pass the buck to "some man" who had healed him, and when the temple leaders asked who, he said he didn't know. Later, when Jesus arrived at the temple, the man saw him, went to the leaders and pointed a finger at Jesus. They ignored the fact that Jesus had healed someone and reprimanded him for doing it on the Sabbath. This is a very convoluted story!

What seems clear is that the man was in no way aware or even grateful that Jesus had healed him, and in fact, "turned him in" probably to save himself from more aggravation. He had excuse after excuse after excuse, and certainly no sense of gratitude. His excuses "passed the buck" to someone else.

There are times we all engage in that same behavior. I have to admit that I originally chose this passage this summer for me to study with the hope that I would recognize and maybe understand my own excuses for not following through on my years of attempts to lose weight. I have had an excuse for everything: it's too restrictive; I'm not losing fast enough; I

have hypothyroidism that stops me from losing; all I do is yo-yo; every time I lose the weight, I put it back on and then some; on and on and on. I was hoping this passage would help me discover a way to give up the excuses and persevere. Of course, it would be nice if Jesus would just heal me, but that would be just too easy! I'm supposed to learn by being involved in the process.

One of my colleagues and a good friend used to commiserate with me. It seemed as if, when she lost weight, I was gaining and vice versa. This year at Annual Conference, she told me about a program that had helped her go beyond just following a diet plan but finally worked to help her find one tiny thing a day to change and not beat herself up when she didn't lose weight quickly. The goal of the program was to work on the internal process and stop feeling like a failure when the scale didn't move downward all the time. Forgiveness of self seems to be the theme – forgive and move on until you aren't focusing on the negatives but on the positives and what you are doing right. So, I'm following her example and will see what happens.

When we make excuses, we give ourselves an "out." We don't recognize the presence of Christ with us or the call that God has in our lives, and we end up trying to blame others for what we could be doing in making positive and healthy changes for body, mind, and spirit. The man at the pool, seemed to be a most self-centered and ungracious man, and it's interesting to realize that Jesus healed him anyway. There was no mention of faith or gratitude or praise or going to show himself to the priests. It was the grace of God offered freely as a gift, and nothing was mentioned about faith, as it has been in so many other healing stories.

Rev. Elisabeth Johnson writes, "If ever we are tempted to think that God's healing depends on the quality or quantity of a person's faith, this passage offers a strong corrective." (From Text This Week commentaries for this passage) I have prayed for years for God to help me with my weight loss attempts, and it isn't that my faith is lacking but that my excuses continue to keep me from being fully involved in the process. I give up too easily. The thing is, God has been working with me, and as I look back at my journey, I can see things that I have learned along the way, so I haven't been alone on the journey, but I haven't acknowledged that God's grace is wide and deep and big enough for me to learn and keep trying.

Faith is believing that God is at work in our lives, even when we are not aware. John Wesley called that Prevenient Grace – the part of grace that works in us, nudges us, carries us, and brings us to awareness of God's presence. Faith leads us to be partners with God in ministry, in caring for others, and in finding ways to heal. But there is no thermometer in measuring how strong or weak our faith is. God's grace is there for everyone. Our faith is the gift of recognizing God's grace in our lives, and living our faith in the world so others can see God at work in our lives.

Today we are introducing something new to our Communion service. I put out a request a few weeks ago to see if anyone would like to be part of a healing prayer team, and I'm thankful that five people have volunteered. If anyone else would like to be part of this, please let me know. What will happen is this: we will forward for communion as we have been, and then anyone who might like to have prayers for healing, either for themselves or stand in for someone else, can go over to the team (*point to where they will be standing*) and receive a prayer with a laying on of hands.

No one has to say what the healing is for, just give your name or the other person's name, and the prayer team will pray the healing prayer that they have on this card with the name inserted. If, after the prayer, you would like to kneel at the altar, or stand for a few moments to add your own prayer, that is fine. Everyone needs healing of some kind, and our

hope is that this will open us to the Spirit's guidance and healing touch in our lives. It is for anyone who would like to be part of it. If you prefer not to receive a prayer that way, that's fine. The grace of God is for everyone, and we all have different ways of receiving that grace. The man by the pool was healed, even though he may not have actually been looking for healing. Sometimes we can be part of helping that healing to happen just by being a friend, showing care, working for justice, finding ways to support and encourage, and certainly by praying for others and for ourselves. Maybe we can pay attention a little more to whether or not we are making excuses for not doing something. And as we move forward and persevere in serving our God, may we find the joy of God's grace filling us and share that with others.

Let us pray: God of grace, you touch our lives even when we are not aware of it. Fill us with the sense of your presence, help us to trust you more and more every day, and help us to live our faith in this world so that we may open doors to healing for ourselves and others. Amen.
