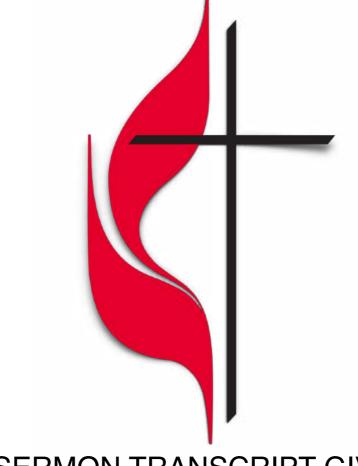

SERMON TRANSCRIPT GIVEN BY REV. DR. DEB HANSON

"Baptism: You Are My Beloved" – 1/12/2020 First UMC – Rev. Dr. Debra J. Hanson

SCRIPTURES: Matthew 3:13-17

THEME: We are God's beloved children.

In January of 2011, I watched with great interest as Ted Williams – called the man with the golden voice – was reunited with his mother. Julia Williams put her hands in her face, weeping for joy, looked up at Ted, said, "I love you. Don't disappointment me again!" Ted's struggles with drugs and alcohol had caused him to lose everything, and even when he did have phone conversations with his mother, she said he would push her away because she tried to encourage him to turn his life over to God. Eventually, Ted did just that, and he seems to be staying sober, giving his mother hope.

Ted said that it was shame that kept him from staying in contact with her all those years, but, at that point, he had turned his life around and been off drugs and alcohol for two years, and he looked for help from others, including his mother, to help him stay on track. The most recent information I could find about him was that he was a sportscaster at a radio station in Ohio and doing well. Julia's love for her son was steadfast, and she said that the only thing that continued to give her hope was her faith in God's presence with him and constant praying.

The love that good parents have for their children is beyond words. It is deep and abiding and strong and persistent. Those of you who are parents or aunts, uncles, or who play any kind of role in a child's life have some understanding of the word "beloved." In our Matthew passage today, Jesus appeared in the wilderness and asked John to baptize him. John resisted, and who could blame him? After all, Jesus was the Messiah, so shouldn't Jesus be the one to baptize John? But Jesus also persisted, so John baptized him, and as Jesus came out of the water, he heard the voice of God saying, "This is my Son, the Beloved, with whom I am well pleased." This is my son, the Beloved. God claimed Jesus; God named Jesus; God loved Jesus. Jesus' baptism was the beginning of his ministry, but more than that, it was an act of affirmation, identifying Jesus as God's Son, as God's chosen One.

In Isaiah 42, we have almost a job description of who this Messiah will be: a servant chosen by God: God's delight; one who brings justice; a strong voice that teaches righteousness; upholds the covenant; is a light to the world; opens the eyes of the blind; and releases the prisoners. We believe that Jesus was the fulfillment of that prophecy, and that not only did he carry out that mission during his time here on earth, he revealed the truth about our God who loves and cherishes ALL human beings. Jesus embodied God; he revealed the character and personality of God to us.

I find the choice of words at Jesus' baptism so powerful: "You are my beloved." Those aren't the words of a distant, disinterested, punitive God, but the words of a very real, loving, connected God. In fact, Eugene Peterson translates the words in The Message this way: "This is my Son, chosen and marked by my love, delight of my life." Delight of my life! Jesus' baptism not only proclaimed his identity, but it was his inauguration into ministry. Martin Luther once said, "Baptism is something done in church one day, but it takes the rest of life to complete." (from Lindy Black's sermon notes found at Text This Week.com, commentary section for this Sunday's readings.) Jesus began his work once his identity as God's son and his calling to do God's work in the world was established.

In this week's commentaries on the Matthew scripture passage, Rev. Sarah Dylan Breuer wrote about the connection between fathers and sons in the culture of Jesus' day. She reminds us that sometimes we hear the saying "Like father, like son," and in Jesus' day that was not just an observation about how the

son resembled or acted like his father. It actually was the belief that the sons either honored or brought shame to their fathers in the way they acted or the choices they made. If we think about the son in the Parable of the Prodigal Son, the youngest son who took all the money and left, spending it carelessly and then returned home penniless, we find that he not only dishonored himself and should have been totally disowned, but he dishonored and brought shame on his father in the eyes of the community.

So, "when we say that Jesus is God's Son, we are also making claims about God" and who God is. Rev. Breuer writes: "When we say that Jesus is God's son, going about the family business, we are saying not only that Jesus is like God; we are saying that God is like Jesus." When we see Jesus, we see, understand, experience God. And when we are baptized into Jesus' baptism, we rise from the water, and God says: "You are my beloved child, the delight of my life!" As Christians, we claim to be followers of Jesus, which means that we are connected with God through the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus, AND we are connected to each other through our baptism. (Found at Text This Week.com under commentaries for 1/9/11)

Baptism is God's naming and claiming of us as God's own child. Baptism is God's work of bringing us new life in Christ. It is God's adoption of us, and it is not only who we are, but also WHOSE we are. In Christ, we are called, commissioned, sent to be the embodiment of Christ in the world. We bring Christ into a living breathing Being who makes a difference in other people's lives by the way we live ours. As the Church of Jesus Christ in the world, we are Christ to the world; we are the hands and feet of Christ in the world.

Evangelist Dwight Moody said: Show me a church where there is love, and I will show you a church that is a power in the community. In Chicago a few years ago a little boy attended a Sunday school. When his parents moved to another part of the city the little fellow still attended the same Sunday school, although it meant a long, tiresome walk each way. A friend asked him why he went so far, and told him that there were plenty of others just as good nearer his home. "They may be as good for others, but not for me," was his reply. "Why not?" she asked. "Because they love a fellow over there," he replied. If only we could make the world believe that we loved them there would be fewer empty churches, and a <u>smaller</u> proportion of our population who never darken a church door. Let love replace duty in our church relations, and the world will soon be evangelized. (<u>Moody's Anecdotes</u>, pp. 71-72, found at Sermon Illustrations.com)

Too many churches have lost their passion for making disciples for Christ. Too many churches have lost their passion for Personal Holiness - meaning our relationship with the world and social justice. John Wesley, the founder of Methodism preached that we need a balance of both, and both are connected to each other. We start by claiming our identity as God's children, and I think that has to start with believing that God loves us!

Every so often I encounter someone who really believes that he or she has been so bad that God could not possibly love them. That is a denial of God's ability to love and the grace of God that is offered freely to everyone. The difficulty isn't that God doesn't love them but that they refuse to accept it. Ted Williams, whom I mentioned at the beginning, finally accepted it. His mother told him over and over again, and he would quickly hang up because he couldn't believe it. He said in the interview with Meredith Viera that he just couldn't handle hearing that God loved him - he had been so bad. But somewhere along the way, God touched his heart, and he finally accepted the gift of God's love, and he turned his life over to Christ. He accepted that he was God's beloved child, just as he was his mother's beloved child.

So I ask each one of us today - including myself - do we believe that we are God's beloved children? Are we willing to accept God's love and grace in our lives? Are we willing to live out our baptism, following in Jesus' example and teachings? Are we willing to work at growing in God's grace and sharing that grace with others as we interact with, live in, and reach out to the world?

In your bulletin is a reaffirmation of baptism, and invite you to join with me as we affirm our baptism together. At the end, I invite you to come up and touch the water in the baptismal font and remember that you are God's beloved child. If you would like to bring a friend or spouse with you, please feel free to share that experience.
