# A Service of Holy Communion for Epiphany

L: Almighty, God, we have come asking for the child — wondering where that love might be born, seeking that joy that might satisfy our thirst, wandering through the darkness of so many mistakes.

We have come to this place where wise people and shepherds and a young woman met. We have come to this place called Bethlehem. To this place where our hearts rise like yeast. To this place where we meet our newborn hope. To this place where we taste our deepest joy and need to praise you.

God, it is in Bethlehem, where we assumed the worst, imagining that no good can come, we somehow missed its name.

Bethlehem. Lehem meaning bread. Bethel meaning house.

There is something here that will satisfy our hunger.

No matter how long we have wandered, here our hearts arise. Your Son, Jesus, our light has come.

In this bread and in this cup, we celebrate something we can't quite understand. Because you have made a house at this table. Because you satisfy our hunger in the most unlikely places. Because you came to be with us. Now and always. It is with this expectation that we come to the table to taste and see that you are here.

## Words of Institution

On the night when he was betrayed, Jesus took bread; gave thanks, broke the bread and gave it to them, saying, "Take, eat; this is my body which is given for you: do this in remembrance of me." [The minister shall break the bread.]

After supper, he took the cup, blessed it and gave it to them, saying, "This cup is the new testament in my blood: do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me." [The minister shall lift the cup.]

The bread which we break and the cup that we share bring us together in the communion of the body of Christ.



SERMON TRANSCRIPT GIVEN BY REV. DR. DEB HANSON

"What Gift Can We Bring?" – 1/5/2020 First UMC, Rev. Dr. Debra J. Hanson

SCRIPTURE: Matthew 2:1-12

THEME: Following Jesus brings us home to God.

An old pioneer traveled westward across the great plains until he came to an abrupt halt at the edge of the Grand Canyon. He gawked at the sight before him: a vast chasm one mile down, eighteen miles across, and more than a hundred miles long! He gasped, "Something musta happened here!" A visitor to our world at Christmas time, seeing the lights, the decorations, the trees, the parades, the festivities, and the religious services, would also probably say, "Something must have happened here!" Indeed, something did happen. God came to our world. (*Illustrations Unlimited*, p. 86, #26).

Today's scripture passage tells us that there were foreigners to Israel who believed that something must have happened there. In this passage we remember the Magi – sometimes called "Wise Men" and often called "kings" although that would not be the case. They traveled from the East – we aren't sure where since the gospel of Matthew doesn't identify which country or countries. Some commentaries have Persia, Babylon, and Arabia. They came from a long distance.

It's also interesting to note that somehow the Western world has given them a number – three – even though Matthew's gospel doesn't tell how many. Some scholars suggest that the number three came from the three gifts of Gold, Frankincense, and Myrrh, and others suggest that there were far more than three Magi. Ultimately, though, that isn't the point of this story anyway.

The point here is about Jesus, born to a poor peasant couple from Nazareth but born to be a King, not of this world but of the kingdom of God. Jesus was a different kind of king, and in essence by the world standards, not a king at all. But the whole idea of a king being born sent Herod into panic mode. It's sometimes hard to understand his frantic paranoia when he learned about the reason for the Magi's trip. The king knew that the Magi sought a baby, so there really wasn't really much of a threat, and certainly this king was not born into wealth or a palace, but in humble surroundings without benefit of nurses and doctors to attend to him and his mother. The paranoia was unreasonable.

But then, Paranoia doesn't need a reason anyway. Herod responded with fear and anxiety about losing his comfy job as king of Israel, even though it meant that he had to be a "yes" man to Pontius Pilate and Caesar in order to stay there. He did everything he could to keep his job, even denying, killing, and imprisoning his own people when they questioned or challenged him – it was all about him. So when the Magi opened up their gifts to the infant Jesus, they also opened the frenzy of fear that resulted in murder and mayhem in Bethlehem after the Holy Family had left.

The Magi could not have known that they started a chain reaction of such heinous actions from Herod because they <u>were</u> smart men who were in tune with signs and wonders, including the star that led them to Bethlehem, and then believing a dream that warned them to return home a different way than they had arrived. Jesus was born into a world much like ours, one that is

full of anger, hatred, fear, paranoia, selfishness, power struggles, and hypocrisy. Jesus was born into a world with the same issues we have – just expressed in different ways.

The gifts of the Magi were the kinds of gifts given to a king: gold – a common gift to a king as a sign of peace and good wishes; frankincense – an expensive perfume used for incense to indicate the presence of a deity; and myrrh – an embalming oil, often explained as an indication of what was to come for Jesus later in life. All these gifts would have helped the Holy Family on their journey to Egypt and provided for their expenses while living there in exile.

Joseph, the faithful earthly father also paid attention to the dreams and signs that God sent to direct him. The star shone brightly in the sky to point to the newborn king, but it would have left the sky and the light of God would guide them out of Israel and again on their return. The star represents the Light of Christ in the world, a reminder that God has entered the world in human flesh and come to live among us. Why? Why would God choose to do such a thing?

One comment I read was this: "If our greatest need had been information, God would have sent us an educator; If our greatest need had been technology, God would have sent us a scientist; If our greatest need had been money, God would have sent us an economist; If our greatest need had been pleasure, God would have sent us an entertainer; but our greatest need was forgiveness, so God sent us a Savior. (Sermon Illustrations.com, Source Unknown.)

So, what does this story tell us? Father Rick Morley writes: "... We're to make our pilgrimage to the Christ. And we're to give him our gifts. And our lives." (*Text This Week under the commentaries for today's gospel lesson.*)

The journey of faith isn't just a one-time accomplishment, but a life-long journey. It isn't taken alone but with the presence of the Spirit with us along the way, as well as dozens, hundreds, and thousands of companions along the way. We are being led by the Star of Bethlehem who now is the Light of the world: Jesus the Savior. Following that Light leads us home to God. On the way, we learn about him, we learn about ourselves, we learn about others, and we learn how to live in a world that is often torn apart and in pain. We might ask ourselves why it's so hard to see Jesus, but it's important to remember that he is everywhere.

Professor Sharron Blezard writes: "Where's Jesus? He's everywhere. He's as near as your neighbor and as far as the deepest darkest recesses of the cosmos. He's holding the hurting, helping the hungry, comforting the afflicted, and afflicting the comfortable. He's as near as the hand and eyes and heart with which we minister. Where's Jesus? Look around you. If you really look, you will see an experience him, and that's what the epiphany is all about." (*Text This Week, commentary section for the gospel lesson.*)

This is why we can celebrate Christmas all year – it is solidly bound to Easter. Without Christmas there is no Easter, and without Easter, there is no Christmas. The Savior of the world is born from both. Our salvation lies in both. We follow the Star so we can find our home – our home with God both here on earth and in heaven.

What gifts can we bring? The answer is throughout the scriptures, but we can start with the fruits of the Spirit found in Galatians 5:22-23: ". . . the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace,

patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control . . ." These are the gifts that lead us to be faithful followers of Jesus, nurturers of others, the helping hands, the caring hearts that so many need to experience.

This past Christmas, our Giving Tree helped so many people, and I heard from one woman who was overwhelmed by the help we gave her. I would like to share just a short part of what she wrote:

I wanted to take a few moments to recognize yourself and the people of your congregation who came together to help our family this holiday season. This truly was a wonderful gift!

Backstory: I'm a single mother to a very rambunctious 5 year old boy and I have taken in my two nephews whom are 11 and 12 years old through DCYF placement. I've been their sole supporter since last January, and I agreed to take them in not knowing what obstacles I might face. These boys have definitely seen their share of challenges in the past several years. They have been in the foster care system for over 3.5 years and have been moved 8 different times. I was so tired of seeing them being moved by the last time I just agreed that I would take them and try to figure it out myself.

This has been anything but easy, and I've had to face not only learning different emotional & psychological struggles, but also be actively involved with three different schools, multiple teachers, counselors, after-school programs, camp leaders, sports, etc... I work 40-50 hours a week to support my little family here so bringing on two additional kiddos has been extremely difficult in itself even just with my time.

[Airial has helped to direct us to places where we can find help such as] backpacks with school supplies, bikes for the boys and make a Christmas miracle happen all with the help of the people at your congregation! I honestly cannot thank [you all] enough!

. . . I want to thank you once more, and thank your congregation for all the wonderful gifts. The smiles on their faces was everything I needed and more.

Let us continue to live, grow and be who God has called us to be in the light of the Star and BY the light of the Star, and let us continue to share the gifts of God that we have been given through the greatest Gift of all.

Extravagant God, you sent Magi with generous gifts to visit the baby Jesus and proclaim his reign to all the world. Make our voices heard when we proclaim God's love to all.
