We are called to be the hands, feet, and voices for God in this world, and we are instructed to be the "voice for the voiceless." Let us continue to strive for justice, and let us continue to walk humbly with God because it is truly God who works through us and our ministries to make a difference in this world.

Church Council meeting on July 23, at 6 pm in the church office.


The **Finance Trustees** and **Church Council** will have a combined meeting on August 13, at 6 pm in the church office.

James S. Cogswell Outstanding Industrial Security Achievement Awards for 2019

QUANTICO, Va. – The Defense Security Service (DSS) is pleased to announce the winners of the 2019 James S. Cogswell Outstanding Industrial Security Achievement Award. Fifty-one facilities were selected for the award, which is presented at the annual NCMS training seminar on June 12, 2019, in St. Louis, Mo.

These 51 facilities were chosen from approximately 13,000 cleared facilities. The award criterion focuses on principles of industrial security excellence. Factors include establishing and maintaining a security program that far exceeds the basic National Industrial Security Program requirements; and providing leadership to other cleared facilities in establishing best practices while maintaining the highest standards for security.

The Cogswell Award selection process is rigorous. A DSS Industrial Security Representative may only nominate facilities that have at a minimum two consecutive superior industrial security review ratings and which show a sustained degree of excellence and innovation in their overall security program management, implementation and oversight. DSS makes the final selections.

The award was established in 1966 in honor of the late Air Force Col. James S. Cogswell, the first chief of industrial security within the Department of Defense. Cogswell was responsible for developing the basic principles of the Industrial Security Program, which includes an emphasis on the partnership between industry and government to protect classified information. This partnership ultimately ensures the greatest protection for the U.S. warfighter and our Nation's classified information.

We are served 102 children from all 6 Portsmouth schools and Birch Tree Center (school for Autistic children in Newington).
