# SERMON TRANSCRIPT GIVEN BY Rev. Dr. Deb Hanson

## Message "All The Saints" Rev. Dr. Debra Hanson

Today's scripture passage is from the Sermon on the Mount, found at the beginning of the gospel of Matthew. This takes place when Jesus has called disciples and just started his ministry. He goes up a mountain where he teaches his followers and the crowd around them about what it means to live as part of the family of God.

This particular section of the Sermon on the Mount is called the "Beatitudes," or blessings. Most of us see ourselves in the receiving end of the blessing which often causes us to wonder what Jesus is really asking of us. Are we blest to be "poor in Spirit" or when we mourn or persecuted or reviled? We can question each blessing and wonder how we fit into it.

Yet, there is another perspective to consider. Jesus is teaching his disciples while the crowd listens, too. The disciples are those who will carry on his work in the world, who will build the church of Jesus Christ, and be in ministry to all. Maybe our perspective can be from the point of view that calls the Church to action, that tells us, as the Church, to be aware, be visible, minister to those who are outcast, rejected, ignored, abused, or experiencing pain and hardship.

Our calling is to be peacemakers, to be merciful, to stand up for those who have no voice, to care for those who are sick, imprisoned, persecuted. We are to be pure in heart; rid ourselves of anger, vengeance, hatred, prejudice, and try to walk in someone else's shoes. Stand with them; care for them; minister to them; be a friend; bring the love, kindness, mercy, and grace of God to them, even as we would want that for ourselves.

Following Jesus isn't an easy path. But when we commit to walking with Christ, we make choices about how we will live in the world, and we are blessed to be a blessing to others. We are blessed to make this world a better place because we build the kingdom of God here on earth by doing what we can and using the gifts God has given us.

Where do we look for examples, besides Jesus and the scriptures? Today is All Saints Day (which happened to actually fall on a Sunday!), and this is when we remember those who have gone before us, who have lived their lives and left a legacy from which we can learn.

Think of the many people who have touched your life, living or deceased. Think of those who brought you to Christ, who lived their lives as witnesses to their faith. We can name the ones who have been in the headlines, written books, and been publicly visible, but there are thousands more who have been witnesses to faith in Jesus Christ, some who have been part of our lives and brought the presence of God to us.

Take a moment to think about them, and name them in your hearts or out loud. (Pause)
