Please be sure you read *The Beacon* because it holds a lot of information, schedules, and material you might need to know! Our newsletter is one of the best ones I have ever seen, and it is a team effort of all those who write and design it, lead fundraisers, head committees, and want you all to know what's going on with all the opportunities available in our world at First UMC!

As I have become a little more familiar with First UMC and all of you, I have begun to see what a great group of people you are! I'm still learning names and trying to "get my head on straight" so I can serve as your pastor with knowledge, love, and care. It will take time, but I appreciate your patience, help, and guidance.

One of the areas I realize we need to highlight is the role of the **Staff Parish Relations Committee**. The SPRC is a group of people who have been elected at the Church Conference and is made up of the pastor, lay leader, and nine people who are members of the church. Our primary responsibility is to promote good relations with the pastor, staff, and between members of the congregation.



The folks who serve on the committee agree to serve for three year terms or "classes," so we have three who will leave the committee at the end of December this year, three in two years, and three in three years. Starting January 1, 2019, three new people will begin serving to fill the slots of the 2018 class.

The following people are currently serving: (through December 2018) Scott Stevens, Evelyn Laux, JoEtte Mac Kenzie, (through December 2019) Karen Sarosiek, Kevin Fickenscher, Cathy VanReenen, and (through December 2020) Mike Coffey (chairperson), Barbara Felton, Nancy Chesser. Sue Sarosiek is the lay leader.

If anyone has questions or concerns about me, the staff, or other congregational relationship concerns, please speak to one of the SPRC members or me. We, on the SPRC, would like to have you all speak to us directly and not go to someone who either doesn't really know or only has part of the information. If anyone has a gripe with me, please talk with me or go to the SPRC folks. We want truth and honesty and straightforward conversations so issues can be resolved in fair and loving ways.

Those who would like more information about the work of the SPRC, please contact us, and we can provide you with information either in print or on the internet if you have access to that. The work of the SPRC is held confidential so we can make decisions that are fair and have as much information as possible. We will share what we can with the congregation when it is appropriate. Also, the SPRC reports a basic report to the Church Council for information. SPRC meetings are not open because of the confidentiality; however, all other meetings are open to everyone. If someone would like to meet with the SPRC about a concern, that can be done by contacting Mike Coffey the chairperson or me.

I realize this is long, but I'm hoping that it will help to clarify the role of the SPRC in the church and clear up some of the misinformation that has gone out.


Finance Committee Update for August, 2018

Pumpkin Unloading Party!
Saturday, September 30 at 9AM

Please save and share these dates:

- <u>Sat., 9/22 from 9 AM-Noonish</u>: Set-Up Put tent up, move pallets (with the help of a pallet jack and operator!), clean and put shelves and vinyl lattice inside tent, put signs up, clean Booth, and organize inside of Booth.
- <u>Sat., 9/30 at 9 AM</u>.: Pumpkin Unloading Party Help unload a tractor trailer truck full of pumpkins and gourds! Young children can help stock the tent with small pumpkins and gourds. Adults, young children and youth can be on the Pumpkin Line bringing medium to large pumpkins from inside the truck onto lawn pallets, help customers finalize their purchases in the Booth and/or sweep the straw out of the truck.
- <u>Sat., 9/30 through Wed., 10/31</u>: 2 adults (+ your children/grandchildren) per 2-3 hour shift in the Booth helping customers finalize their purchases. Consider working the same shifts each week. This is our GREATEST NEED!!! Continue spreading the word to folks in the community to ensure we can continue having the Patch!
- On/Near Sat., 10/20: 2nd Pumpkin Unloading Party Since we only need 1/3 of a truck, PumpkinsUSA must fill the rest with other deliveries close to us. ACTUAL DATE AND TIME TO BE SHARED LATER IN OCTOBER.
- Early Nov. (Date to be determined): Pumpkin Patch Take Down Take tent down, move pallets (with the help of a pallet jack and operator!),
- move Booth and fill with tent, shelves, vinyl lattice, and signs.

Other ways to help during the Patch:

- -Help bake pies at church on Tuesdays and Fridays from 9 AM 2 PM On-the-job training provided.
- -Bake/make goodies any day!

Our customers LOOK TO BUY homemade goodies

(pies, brownies, cookies, cupcakes, fudge, candy, flavored breads, etc.) every day.

-Pray for everyone who comes to the Patch.



PumpkinsUSA's Patch Manual recommends that different committees coordinate specific areas. However, for all but the first few years of ours, I have shouldered the bulk of the coordination. So Church Council encouraged me to list the areas we need help with. <u>Any amount of time is appreciated and I'll provide training.</u> A great big THANK YOU to those who checked off areas of interest on the recent survey!

- -Co-Coordinator: Someone to help me keep/maintain my sanity and divide tasks between us.
- -Booth Schedulers: The online Signupgenius.com, office, and weekly schedules in the Booth need to stay updated when people sign up in any of these places. A few people are needed to call and/or email from a list of active congregants and past community volunteers to fill remaining 2-3 hour shifts for the coming week. You can do this for a week or more, and will be trained.
- "Emergency" Booth Staffers: Anyone who may be available to fill last-minute shifts.
- -<u>Small Group of "Counters"</u>: Typically volunteers working the 4-6:30 p.m. shift stay to count the Pumpkin and Food Sales that day. As we continue to expand our Booth Staffing base into the community, it seems wise to limit the number of people having access to the church offices and key locations.
- -<u>Small Group of Patch "Tarpers" and "Untarpers</u>: Frost kills pumpkins, so whenever it is expected, we tarp the lawn pumpkins at 6:30 p.m. and untarp them the next day before the Patch opens.
- -Food Coordinator(s): At least 1 person to sign a few people up to bake/make homemade goodies, hopefully for each day of the Patch. "Church Pies" are ready on Tuesdays and Fridays around noon.
- -Only on Pumpkin Unloading Party days:
 - "Tent Unloading Coordinator": 1 person to guide people on how and where to unload boxes of small pumpkins and gourds onto tent shelves.
 - "Inside Truck Coordinator": 1 person to coordinate/manage safe pumpkin unloading inside the truck.
 - "Pumpkin Line Coordinator": 1-2 people to manage the Pumpkin Line when people add to or leave it, and guiding pumpkin placement on pallets.
- -"Clicker": 1 person to use clicker to count the number of bulk pumpkins (including rotten ones) as they come off the truck. Can be done standing or sitting near the open end of the truck. Give "clicker" to me at end of unloading.
- -<u>Sweeper(s)</u>: After pumpkins are unloaded, sweep the floor of the truck, putting straw onto tarp at end of the truck. Then drag tarp to designated location.
- -Refreshments: 2-3 people to set up 2 tables, a trash can and recycling bin near Booth; arrange bottled water, homemade and/or store-bought snacks, and napkins on tables. Clean up and put stuff away after unloading.




