

9/21, Pumpkin Patch set up us at 9 am. Help is needed!


9/28, Pumpkin Delivery will be at 9:00 am at FUMC.



SERMON TRANSCRIPT GIVEN BY REV. DR. DEB HANSON

SCRIPTURE: Luke 14:25-33

THEME: Jesus is the foundation of our lives.

Imagine walking along the road in Galilee and this happens: A friend comes to you and says, "Hey! See that crowd up ahead? They are all following Jesus of Nazareth! Do you know about him? He does miracles! He heals the sick, feeds thousands of people with just a few loaves of bread and some fish, and he talks back to the temple leaders! Want to go find out what this is all about?" Most of us would probably answer, "Sure. Let's see what's going on." The crowd becomes larger and larger as Jesus and his disciples make their way through the streets that are already full of merchants and their wares, donkeys, camels, and people who are doing their marketing.

But everything seems to come to stop when Jesus stops. It's like the old, old commercial about EF Hutton: in a noisy, crowded room full of conversation and movement, an EF Hutton representative opens his or her mouth to speak and the room immediately stops so people can hear what is going to be shared. Maybe Jesus was tired of all the people around him, and he probably was tired of being known for his miracles. His popularity may have worn on him because so many people simply didn't understand the message he was trying to share.

So, maybe he said the things in our scripture passage to scare some away, and I'm sure he succeeded, too. "What? Hate father, mother, wife, children, brothers, sisters, life itself in order to be his disciple? I don't think so. I'm out of here." For those who stayed, he added, "You must carry a cross." Most likely, everyone in Jesus' day knew what a cross was, and it wasn't pretty. The cross meant execution by the government with a slow tortuous death by being nailed to it and hanging there until the person died. Uh – uh, not doing that, Jesus!

Those who still remained heard an explanation about what they needed to know in choosing to follow Jesus. If they were going to follow him, they needed to go past the miracles, past the food, past all the publicity he had received, and be ready to follow him to the very end. It would be just like a builder who has to estimate the cost of the tower so he has enough material to finish the project, and a king who assesses whether or not he has the right number of troops to win a battle. If not, he figures out a way to negotiate a treaty and peace.

I suspect the crowd had whittled down quite a bit by this time, and Jesus puts in one last instruction just to be sure everyone who was still there understood: "If you follow me, you MUST give up all your possessions." Oops – the final straw. I wonder how many were still there after that one! I wonder how many of us would be there, too. I wonder how many of us understand all this!

In the commentaries I read, many of the writers said that this was a very difficult passage, and they suspected that a number of pastors would be looking for something else on which to preach. But it seems to me, that would be the very reason to use it as the basis for a sermon, which is why I decided to use it. It's definitely a challenge!

What DOES it mean to follow Jesus? We believe he is God in the flesh, so ultimately, we are asking what does it mean to believe in and live following Jesus' example and teachings about being a child of God here on earth? What is required of us? Do we really have to hate our families?

Years ago, I read a story about a woman who was brought up in a home without faith or any belief in a power greater than herself. As she grew up, she felt as if something was missing, and in her mid-forties, a friend invited her to attend church. Something happened inside her, and she knew she had found what had been lacking in her life. Over the course of months, she attended church, Bible studies, prayed, and participated in discussions. Eventually she was baptized and joined the church. All this time, she had not told her husband, children, parents, or siblings that she had found God and was transformed, although they had seen a change in her. Finally, after her baptism, she shared her experience and invited them to join her.

All I can remember from her story was that they all demanded that she give it up and rejected her new-found faith. They were threatened by her confidence and assurance in having Jesus as the anchor of her faith. Her husband eventually divorced her, her children separated themselves from her, and the rest of her family disowned her. She was, by all appearances, completely alone in the world except that she had a church family who then became her family. Over the years that followed, apparently one of her children came around, but for the most part, she ended up choosing God over her family.

Most of us don't have to make that choice, but there are places in our world where it still happens. A family member of another religion converts to Christianity, and their families disown them or worse. Some people have, even in this day and age, been imprisoned for their belief in Jesus. There are folks who experience ridicule for being a faithful follower of Jesus, and they are ostracized at work or in a group or at school. Does that merit hating those who reject them, even – or maybe especially – when they are family? No.

The parallel passage in Matthew 10 reads: Whoever loves father or mother more than me is not worthy of me; and whoever loves son or daughter more than me is not worthy of me; ³⁸ and whoever does not take up the cross and follow me is not worthy of me. (NRSV) The writer of Luke has a much harsher approach and the translators for the Luke passage chose "hate" which, in Greek, actually means more about priority rather than what we think of as rejection and strong negative feelings that are associated with the word "hate."

Carrying the cross is Jesus' letting the people know that he will experience his death on the cross. He knows what lies ahead, and he not only is preparing them, but also himself: if we choose to follow Jesus, we follow him to the cross. When we think of the cross, it is helpful to remember that the cross was not the end but the beginning. It was the beginning of forgiveness of sins, the beginning of life in Christ, the beginning of the opportunity for fulfillment in Christ.

We often think of it as a negative thing, but bearing – or carrying – the cross means that we choose life: life following the one who gave us life. Jesus' point is well taken: following him demands commitment, perseverance, and sacrifice. Sometimes we sacrifice something we really want to do in order to minister to someone else or to help in making a church event

happen. I think of the dedication of SO many people here who pitch in so that the Pumpkin Patch will run for an entire month (and a little more than that actually).

I think of the people who have boarded planes to go to the Dominican Republic to help clean up there following Hurricane Dorian. Whether or not they are followers of Jesus, they are still doing important work and giving up something at home. The people involved in the UMCOR (United Methodist Committee on Relief) are all over the world, and they have to be ready to show up following a disaster to help others. They give up time, money, comfort, and time with their families in order to help the people who are suffering loss of home, all they have, and some even have lost family members.

Putting Jesus first means leaving our need for things at the bottom of our priority list. It means that number one on the priority list is Jesus, and everything else comes afterward. Can we do that? Probably not – at least not consistently. But I have learned as I continue to study, pray, observe the saints in our churches, and the ones in the family of God that having Jesus as the number one priority doesn't take all the rest away, but puts it in perspective.

Dave always says about the possessions we have, "They are just things. They can be replaced." Of course, people can't be replaced, but we can grow in our relationship with Jesus so that we live as he would have us live and love even more fully and with more gratitude about the people in our lives who are so important. Putting Jesus first – God first – doesn't take all that away, but gives us a grounding in order to see what we have as a blessing and to work at our relationships, our giving, and our purpose here on earth.

How do we understand the importance of following Jesus as a priority? One pastor talked about it as a kind of pride - the good kind of pride. The pride that we feel when we want something to be special because we believe in what we are doing and the kind of pride that speaks to others because we have done well and witnessed to how worthwhile what we do is. He writes:

When I was in high school, our band director instilled in us a sense of pride that permeated the group. Because we were proud of the band to which we belonged, we were willing to work harder to perfect our half-time show or hone our concert performance. We weren't satisfied with second-best, so we regularly took top honors in the contests we entered. Our pride also extended to the way we behaved at school, and even off-campus. "Everything you do reflects on the band," Mr. Kuentz would say. "Don't do anything to disgrace the uniform you wear." That kind of pride was positive, because it encouraged us to do our best, and it fostered esprit de corps. [a feeling of pride, fellowship, and common loyalty shared by the members of a particular group] (Tod OL Mundo, found in the commentaries for this week's lectionary passages)

Being a follower of Jesus isn't about the kind of pride that fosters a sense of superiority, but it's just doing what we are called to do as his disciples in this world. Sometimes it means making choices that are difficult. When children decide to be in some traveling sports group, they are required to be fully committed, and that means giving up some of the other things they may want to do. Unfortunately, it often affects deciding to skip Sunday school or youth group. But if we think about this as an analogy, it is helpful in considering what Jesus is asking of us.

I borrowed some of these ideas from Rev. David Lose:

A lot of parents give up nearly every weekend for their kids' travelling sports team. And lots of career-minded folks put in long hours in jobs they don't love in order to secure their futures or just to make ends meet. Lots of our people are spending hard-earned money to join a gym or participate in diet programs to get healthier. And how many of our families sacrifice in order to make sure their kids are dressed well and have a chance for further education?

Because these things are important to us, we make these and other sacrifices. We sacrifice according to our priorities. And in today's passage Jesus is saying that the Kingdom of God he proclaims and the kingdom life he exemplifies should be a priority, actually be the priority.

So when we look at Jesus' parable a bit, put it into today's context, we can ask, "What parent wouldn't count the cost before signing up for the traveling soccer team and what new employee wouldn't consider whether she is willing to work every weekend her first year?" Many people are already making sacrifices, and in this passage, Jesus is saying that Christian discipleship calls for the same type of giving of our time, talent, and treasures. How do we set our priorities? How can we put following Jesus first and keep working at keeping him there so our discipleship informs our decisions about how we spend and give of our money, how we help others, how we find ways to give generously of our time, talent and treasure, how we interact with family and friends, how important our possessions are to us and whether or not they have a hold on us, and how we continue to be the Church of Jesus Christ in the world.

This isn't an instant zap, this becoming a disciple and keeping Jesus as our top priority. It's a journey. It's learning and growing so we walk the walk and talk the talk. It's living so others can see Jesus at work in and through us. And we all are gifted with the ability to be uniquely who we are as God's beloved child. God has called us to this place, to this ministry, to this blessing so that we can be a blessing to others. We do it together as the Church. We do it together with Christ. Thanks be to God!
